The Pak 'n Save Gien Innes Eastern Suburbs Soapbox Derby was held on Saturday in Stonefields Ave with the top entrants going through to the national

event the next day.

The teams were whittled down to eight and then a final four. Meadowbank School was second and Stonefields School came third. Fourth place went to the Riverhead Scouts team

from west Auckland.

The event was Stonefields' first attempt at soapbox racing.

"It's been great for the school and great for the community," associate principal Chris Bradbeer says.

"People have walked up from the development to watch and so many have said to me they want to be involved next year."

The race was organised by the Rotary Club of Auckland East. Members were on site at 6am to set up and worked two long days to make sure everything ran smoothly.

Schools lease their soapbox car from the Rotary club and invite businesses to sponsor them in order to cover costs.

Soapbox teams are made

up of a pit crew, drivers, a cheer squad and many

willing parents and teachers.
A soapbox car has no engine. They are released from the starting blocks on a steep street and it is gravity and the driver's ability to hold a straight line that

determine the winner.
Soapbox racing is a serious
business. Cars are checked
before racing to make sure
they comply with
regulations.

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They must be weighted evenly and their weight is checked before they reach starting blocks. All of the wheels are swapped out before the finals to make sure none have been tampered with and everyone has a fair go.

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Stonefields Ave was closed over the weekend for two days of soapbox racing. Schools from all over the eastern suburbs took part.


